KEYNOTE: AISHA BOWE FOUNDER AND CEO, STEMBOARD



Aisha Bowe

Aisha Bowe is a former NASA Aerospace Engineer, and the founder and CEO of STEMBoard, an engineering solutions company that recently ranked in the top half of the 2020 Inc. 5000 fastest growing company list. As an aerospace engineer who started her degree with pre-algebra in a community college, Aisha is on a mission to help youth break stereotypes, stop internalizing false narratives and believe in themselves, and pursue careers in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math).

In response to COVID-19, Aisha and her team designed and launched LINGO. A self-paced, at-home coding kit, LINGO enables learners to explore and enhance their STEM skills in a fun and engaging way through hands-on instruction. The home version and a school edition support the new remote teaching model imposed by the pandemic. Clients include tech giants such as Microsoft, GE, HBCUs and Non-Profit institutions like Southern University, Bowie State, and Howard Middle School.

Aisha holds a B.S.E in Aerospace Engineering and an M. Eng. in Space Systems Engineering, from the University of Michigan.

Before COVID, Aisha traveled the world sharing her personal story of triumph to inspire students from disadvantaged communities, especially girls, to pursue a career in STEM. Today, she does the same virtually.

Shine MSD

It is during our darkest moments that we shine the light. Following the tragic mass shooting that took place at Stoneman Douglas High School, the world came to know the students of this high school were a bit different. Some jumped to action in the political arena. Others turned their efforts toward the arts. Many from both sides had significant roots in the drama department at Stoneman Douglas High School.

Two of those drama students, Sawyer Garrity and Andrea Peña, channeled their pain and anger into writing an original song called Shine days after the tragedy. What started as a personal healing journey quickly grew into an anthem met with an overwhelming response from Parkland and those who saw them perform at the CNN town hall on February 21, 2018. Sawyer, Andrea, their families and friends realized the power of healing through artistic expression, and the positive impact the arts has in inspiring hope and unity in the aftermath of tragedy.




Lupe Yepiz


She also has previous experience in Santa Clara County Juvenile Probation Department as a Probation Counselor and served as a Buddhist Chaplain for the jail system.

As a court recognized Domestic Violence and Strangulation expert she trained law enforcement officers and domestic violence practitioners on issues of Domestic Violence, Strangulation, Stalking, Dominant Aggressor Analysis, Lethality Assessment, and Domestic Violence laws. Officer Zen is a recipient of the Blue and Gold Award, the Unsung Hero Award, and the inaugural Melinda Zen Award for her exceptional work within the Domestic Violence field as well as her commitment to helping Domestic Violence survivors and to holding batterers accountable.

She led the organization's non-partisan civic engagement programs that are building a strong grassroots base of low-income voters of color in Silicon Valley.

Previously, she worked with the South Bay AFL-CIO Labor Council. She spent three years teaching English and Social Studies in Bogota, Colombia after having spent several years working for then-City of San Jose Vice Mayor Cindy Chavez.

As of 2019, more than 140,000 people of Vietnamese descent live in Santa Clara County; however, there is a high percentage of Vietnamese people considered non-English proficient, delivering culturally appropriate and linguistically competent information is more important than ever.

COVID-19 information is constantly evolving, and Ly Vo serves as the Lead for the Vietnamese Language Access Team to make sure that there are no language barriers to resources and information the County has created. As part of her scope of work, she serves as the liaison between Vietnamese media; translates County documents for schools, parents, businesses; leads weekly forums where the Vietnamese community can ask questions, etc.

Currently she is leading efforts to bring more testing and vaccination sites to the hard-hit South County communities.

She co-founded the Health and Racial Equity Task Force as well as South County Contra COVID, focusing on outreach and education of the Latinx community. Rebeca was a founding Board member of CARAS, the Community Agency for Resources, Advocacy and Service, which provides services and advocacy for underserved residents, as well as cultural events.

In 2016 Rebeca co-founded Gilroy Growing Smarter and led the campaign for Yes on Measure H to ensure the preservation of our open spaces, while allowing room for affordable housing and industries that provide sustainable jobs. Chavez, Assemblymember Campos began her work for economic, social, environmental, and political justice as a young girl when she marched with her parents alongside farm workers. Growing up in a working class neighborhood of San Jose, Nora worked to advance incentives to keep thousands of jobs in California and make neighborhoods safe. Assemblymember Campos served San Jose as a Councilmember from 2001 to 2010, where she transformed the Story and King Road shopping area from a neglected and high-crime area in San Jose into a bustling shopping district that increased this economically struggling community's tax base by 105 percent.



Hon. Yvonne Martinez-Beltran

Yvonne Martínez Beltrán is a mother of 3, urban planner, and small businesses owner committed to public service and community building. She worked in high tech Business Development, before moving to NYC to study and work in economic development, housing, and commercial real estate. Martínez Beltrán serves as a Councilwoman and previously served as a Mayor Pro Tempore and Planning Commissioner for her hometown, the City of Morgan Hill.

During Nora's term on the San Jose City Council, she addressed the need to house San Jose's workforce by adding over 10,000 new housing units in San Jose. Nora was elected to the California State Assembly in November of 2010 and served as the Assembly's Speaker Pro Tempore, Democratic Whip, Chair of the Budget Subcommittee 5 on Public Safety and was appointed in February 2013 as one of the Assembly's representatives on the California Commission on the Status of Women and Girls. In the Assembly, Nora championed equal pay for women, the economic interests of Silicon Valley, world-leading climate change policies, college opportunity for DREAMERS, the right for children to learn English, and healthcare for every child in California. Carmen Castillo




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Mikelle Le, M.A., LMFT
